



Key highlights of this year include public policy efforts at the state and federal level. We are thankful for our Members of Congress, governors, and legislators who worked together to pass vital legislation enabling primary care providers to continue providing the public with necessary medical, dental, mental and behavioral health, and substance use disorder services.

This report also acknowledges the challenges we have encountered, including weather and cyber related emergencies impacting our members and communities. We continue to share emergency preparedness resources, including climate impacts on health, and monitoring incidents like Change Healthcare.

We continued our support of workforce development through the Harvard School of Dental Medicine AEGD Dental Residency Program, the Maple Mountain Teaching Health Center Consortium and White Mountain Medical Education Consortium Family Medicine Residency Program, and the promotion of upskilling tools.

As we look ahead, we are filled with optimism and determination. Bi-State is committed to fostering a collaborative and inclusive environment where all residents continue to have access to the primary care they need. We are grateful to the Community Health Centers' boards of directors, executive leadership, primary care providers, and support staff for their unwavering commitment to the health and success of their patients and communities.

The residents of our two states need patient centered access to primary care, mental and behavioral health, substance use disorder, dental, and enabling services delivered within their communities by organizations that understand their needs. Bi-State informs and educates policymakers and stakeholders in support of key federal programs that assist those most in need in our two states, including: Community Health Centers; National Health Service Corps; Teaching Health Centers; Women, Infants, and Children; Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program; Area Health Education Centers; Family Planning; and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families.

The United States Congress continues to provide primary care, workforce, and prevention resources to ensure residents receive comprehensive primary care services in New Hampshire and Vermont. We appreciate the leadership and steady commitment evidenced by our Members of Congress in support of the residents of our two states. Bi-State also works closely with the United States Health Resources and Services Administration through the bureaus of Primary Health Care and Health Workforce to advance our mutual goal of access to comprehensive, culturally appropriate primary care for the individuals and families in our communities.

New Hampshire Government Relations:

During the 2024 New Hampshire legislative session, we achieved policy wins on key legislation impacting access to affordable primary care for Granite Staters.

Established voluntary Community Health Worker certification that makes CHWs' services reimbursable by Medicaid and other insurance providers.

Eliminated pharmacy benefit managers' ability to pickpocket health centers' 340B savings. Expanded the definition of a vaccine to include respiratory syncytial virus biological product, making the RSV immunization available to all children through the NH Vaccine Association.

Secured \$300,000 for the State Loan Repayment Program for those in the nursing profession.

Vermont Government Relations

During the 2024 Vermont legislative session, we played a key role in achieving several policy goals that support access to primary care.

- Made permanent the state's policy on commercial insurance covering telehealth services and achieved parity in payment for audio-only telehealth services.
- Reduced provider administrative burden by waiving for primary care commercial prior authorizations for non-pharmacy care, adding exemptions for step-therapy requirements, and increasing clarity around claims submissions.
- Expanded income eligibility to 145% federal poverty level for the Medicare Savings Program, thereby reducing financial barriers to care for Medicare beneficiaries.
- Worked with the state agencies on bringing FQHC rates in line with their current scope of services.

Training and Technical Assistance

Recruiting the Next Generation of Health Professionals to Serve the Underserved

Bi-State plays a crucial role in supporting Community Health Centers in attracting, recruiting, and retaining health professionals who are dedicated to serving rural and underserved communities. Thanks to the efforts of Bi-State's Recruitment Center, 32 new health professionals were recruited to practice in Vermont and New Hampshire this year. The Recruitment Center tracks the staffing needs of local practices and promotes these opportunities to a national audience of doctors, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, dentists, and mental health and substance use disorder professionals. The Recruitment Center gets to know clinicians and connects them with a community and a practice that matches their interests.

Integrating Primary Care and Behavioral Health to Provide Whole-Person Care

Funded by the NH Department of Health and Human Services (Bureau of Drug and Alcohol Services), Bi-State is working with three New Hampshire Community Health Centers to enhance their capacity to deliver comprehensive integrated Medication Assisted Treatment services and supports for pregnant, postpartum, and parenting women with opioid use disorders. In FY24, 48 woman received a broad array of critical services to support recovery and improve the quality of life for them and the infants and children affected by their opioid use.

A Story of Success - Connecting Health Professionals with Communities in Need

April P., originally from New Hampshire, left the state to pursue higher education, with the dream of practicing primary care in a small town like her hometown. As graduation approached, she was unsure where to begin her job search until she discovered Bi-State's Recruitment Center. Responding to an ad, April connected with Bi-State who took the time to understand her priorities for both community and practice. We connected April with several practices that aligned with her goals. Among them, one stood out due to its proximity to her family. When that practice offered her a position, April eagerly accepted.

Food Access & Health Care

This year, with Bi-State's support, three Vermont Community Health Centers, the Northern Tier Center for Health (NOTCH), Little Rivers Health Care, and Lamoille Health Partners, continued their innovative food access programming. In May, NOTCH hosted the Food Access and Health Care Consortium with a guided tour of the health center in Richford and concluded with a recipe demonstration from the SNAP-Ed curriculum. Building on this, Bi-State established a new food access peer group in June, providing a valuable platform for Community Health Centers to discuss the successes and challenges of food programs across Vermont and New Hampshire.


